ABOUT THE PLAY

Jonathan Tolins' The Last Sunday in June is a hilarious and poignant exploration of friendship, identity, and the shifting landscape of gay life in New York City. Following in the tradition of landmark works such as The Boys in the Band and Love! Valour! Compassion!, Tolins brings sharp wit and emotional honesty to a story that balances humour with heartfelt reflection.

Set in a Greenwich Village apartment, Michael and Tom plan to spend Gay Pride Day quietly, reflecting on their relationship and their upcoming move to the country. But as the Pride Parade marches by their window, a series of unexpected visits from old friends turns the afternoon into an unforgettable confrontation with love, change, and the complicated ties that bind them together.

DIRECTOR'S NOTE

When *The Last Sunday in June* first opened more than twenty years ago, it captured a community at a turning point. It looked back on decades of struggle and forward to a hopeful but uncertain future. Coming back to the play now, it feels like holding a mirror up to both the past and present. It's a reminder of how far we've come, and how questions about identity, belonging and authenticity still shape who we are today.



Tolins writes with wit and warmth, but beneath the surface lies something tender and searching. The play begins with friends gathered for what seems like an ordinary Pride Day in New York. Yet, as the day unfolds, old wounds and new insecurities rise to the surface. The characters wrestle with how to be honest with themselves and each other, how to love fully, and how to live truthfully in a world that keeps changing around them.

Over the past two decades, Pride itself has transformed from protest to celebration, from the margins to the mainstream. For many, that shift represents progress and safety. For others, it raises questions about what's been lost along the way. Has visibility come at the cost of authenticity? Has comfort dulled the urgency that once defined our community?

This play explores the tension between comfort and courage, between belonging and being true to yourself. The characters' struggles with identity, relationships and community still feel as real now as they did in 2003. What moves me most is the universality of it all. Beneath the specific lens of gay male friendship and love is a question that belongs to everyone: how do we stay true to ourselves while still being part of something larger?

In directing this piece, I wanted to honour the time it came from while also inviting reflection on where we are now. What does community mean in 2025? What does Pride look like today, and what might it look like in the years ahead?

For me, *The Last Sunday in June* is about the messy, beautiful act of being seen. It's about honesty, connection and the courage it takes to live authentically—even when the parade has passed by.
